Wealthy or poor, we belong to God.



As our turn ended, a storm knocked out power for the next host congregation. Midst snow banks and salt trucks, folk were scrambling to secure warmth and shelter for those who would otherwise be without. The pivot was natural and seamless. Volunteers, pastors, and staff started working out the logistics, securing volunteers, and clearing calendars. Before the last email faded from the screen, we were ready. There are so many saints here whose sleeves are rolled up and whose robe hems are tattered and worn.

Each time I pour the water and say, "Welcome home, Children of God," I know it is a flawed metaphor. Too many folks are without homes. Too many folks are in homes that aren't safe. Like all metaphors, Home is imperfect language for the koinonia we seek to awaken to within and through these walls. Though flawed, it still speaks of who and whose we are. It challenges us to embrace, each day, the love we are called to live and share. Welcome home is a way of saying, "We belong to God, and we think you do too."

Yet, respecting the traditions of First Pres, and each other, and with a shared unwavering commitment to the church and its mission, Session always hears God's message and finds the path forward.

It has indeed been a privilege and blessing to serve as Clerk of Session.

I am grateful for the opportunity to spend the last ten years of ministry here at First Pres. It's been a wonderful time of fruitful ministry, and I am excited about the future of First Pres, and equally enthusiastic about my retirement. My final day as your Associate Pastor and Director of the Resident Ministry Program was January 31, 2024.

It's been a rewarding 10 years, full of challenges, joys, and, yes, stiff tests. I am pleased to have spent this period with devoted colleagues in shared, collaborative work. Our shared triumphs. sorrows, and hurdles are what have made us a thriving church together. I am so very thankful for each of you. To have known you and worked with you has enriched my life incalculably.

In Resident Ministry, our regular pattern of active, reflective ministry continued with Revs. Megan Berry and Hannah Lundberg until mid-summer 2023. In July, Megan took a call to a strong congregation in Madison, Wisconsin, while Hannah remained at First Pres in a transitional role. Both are splendid young pastors. My second priority for 2023 was to set the Resident Ministry program up for success. So, the first five months of 2023 were spent recruiting, interviewing, and inviting a new cohort of Resident Ministers to come to Ann Arbor. After seminary visits, virtual interviews, and reference checks, we invited three qualified candidates to Ann Arbor for inperson conversations in March 2023, and then extended invitations to Nathaniel Fryer and Tommy Langejans to join this important First Pres ministry. I was thrilled!

Out of view, a less visible process of planning, preparation, and transition was underway with the Resident Ministry Work Group as I began to conclude my role as director of the program and hand off leadership responsibilities to Dave Prentice-Hyers through the connections of Hannah Lundberg.

Our 2023 Local Mission projects were focused on the real human needs of people for shelter, food security, poverty reduction, and community mental health. We continued work with our Feeding Our Neighbors, a.k.a. Big House Food Rescue, reclaiming hundreds of pounds of food after UM athletic events; and then Huron Valley Habitat. I'm proud we supported Friends in Deed and the Circles Ministry in Ypsilanti as we play a part in helping people rise from poverty. The genius of the Rotating Shelter program was again engaged with the full hearts and generous hands of many volunteers. Ministries with





Hope Clinic, as well as Cass Community Center in Detroit, continued as well. Our Local Mission Grant Program, guided by Martha Kershaw, directed more than \$75,000 to local programs and ministries.

In the broad arena of social justice, important gains were made in gun violence prevention and advocacy for stricter gun regulations. Likewise, our Racial Justice group continued its vital work of education and advocacy. A 2023 highlight was the dedication of the Matthew J. Warfield Library in October.

I am grateful for the three-month sabbatical that I was granted for the time from October 15, 2023, to January 15, 2024. Not surprisingly, Beth and I have used this period for healing and processing the grief of the unexpected death of our son, for a time of extended rest and recovery, for travel, for family visitation, and for spiritual replenishment. I also used the time to plan an engaged retirement. I increased my knowledge in Appreciative Inquiry as I imagined, and I will use my skills in the near future. In retirement, Beth and I will make a new home in Charlottesville, Virginia, in 2024, where we look

forward to a more leisurely life there filled with good books, friends new and old, hiking in the Blue Ridge, raising vegetables and flowers, riding, and enjoying our Labradors. I am excited about an unbidden and still developing part-time ministry opportunity. When the way is clear, I will share the details.

So, this is an excellent time to conclude this ministry. I will miss working with a host of talented leaders on the Session, in Resident Ministry, Mission, and Formation, as well as my dear, devoted, and faithful ministry colleagues. All have been incredibly positive participants in our unique and collaborative work. Together, we have encountered many challenges and changes, and I have learned much about leadership, healthy relationships, and collegiality. Thank you!

I feel such deep gratitude for this ten-year opportunity to make God's love visible in our Ann Arbor community! First Pres is a strong, healthy, inclusive, and compassionate community. I am confident that God has great things in store for this congregation in the coming years.

For ten years, these thoughts fused in my spirit, I've embraced a ministry of pilgrimage, bringing together members to grow in faith through intentional journeying to sacred places. Past the terror of COVID-19, two trips occurred. Sixteen of us walked in the other-worldly Highlands of Iceland, hiking the Laugavegur Trail in August; Nineteen pilgrims walked 110 miles in Portugal to reach Spain's Cathedral of Santiago. Worshipping in Reykjavik and Santiago was moving and transformative. These mixed-gender groups were singles and couples from 54 to over 80 years old. Our approach to this spiritual practice is unique. Pilgrims spent over 20 hours in preparatory meetings, hours training on local trails, and endless conversations about gear. They endured close companionship together in planes, on







trails, and over meals. God appeared in the small moments of companionship, conversation, and challenge — and in the beauty of country and culture. Deep bonds of friendship and faith were formed. This work was rewarding and taxing, and you will hear more about the benefits and blessings of these trips at an upcoming Adult Education Session.

Pilgrimage sustains me for the work of daily ministry. Engaging in countless staff meetings and planning sessions with members in caregiving ministry and adult formation, attending to innumerable phone calls, personal meetings, and pastoral visits, and leading 19 memorial services — all of it is inspiring and fatiguing. In journeying away from daily ministry, giving space for God to speak to our deepest needs, decompression and reflection occur. The gifts of pilgrimage return to our members needing guidance and support, those facing challenges to their faith and families. The Spirit sets us in step with God. On pilgrimage, we move in a way that directs a maturation of our faith and an ultimate transformation of our souls.

Other highlights of this year included fast-track sessions, hearing new members share their appreciation for the authentic hospitality of our congregation, taking on the training of new officers this past fall because of Jay's retirement, and officiating at the weddings of our members in Ann Arbor and other places — especially the wedding of Elder Jen Day and David Deromedi, two of our Santiago pilgrims. Working with the Deacons, Mature Ministries, and Congregational Life Committee, the members of those groups call out the best in me, and I serve those groups with delight.

My call looks different every year, depending on the makeup of the pastoral staff. My new opportunity to work in the educational realm with Adult Faith Formation Chair Jane Dutton and a terrific team has deepened my curiosity and creativity. New pastors and other staff grow my patience and widen my perspective, and taking time to become friends and colleagues who mutually support one another is critically important. Our Lord leads us onward as we near our 200th year. First Pres is on a pilgrimage with God of becoming even more than we can imagine. Walking with you, I am grateful, wondering, and wandering on this journey, trusting in the ultimate destination.

Tod Bolsinger, a professor of leadership formation at Fuller Seminary says that when Lewis and Clark, on their famed expedition across the country, hit the Continental Divide, they expected to encounter a river that would allow them to paddle easily to the Pacific Ocean. Instead, what they found was not a flowing river but the Rocky Mountains. Bolsinger says that this is what church leaders are encountering today. Churches are going to have to figure out that it isn't that we need to "paddle harder," rather, we "have to make an adaptation, and the key to adaptation begins with going back to your deepest core value."

As Taylor Swift alludes to, it's hard to know where we're going when we can really only know where we've been. This past year, I was privileged to be able to continue my work with youth and families. With Beca's maternity leave and subsequent departure in the early part of the year, our search for a Coordinator of Children & Family Ministries

over the summer, and then the onboarding of new staff (woot woot for Heather Polikoff joining us), there's been a lot of transitions. With Rev. Jay Sanderford's sabbatical in the fall and transition to retirement, I began working with our Mission committee & various work groups, including the social justice work groups.

Whether it's rivers or the Rocky Mountains I encounter, the one constant in life is change. Yet, in the midst of change, there is new life, new possibilities, new growth. It isn't easy. Sometimes it may seem odd or unconventional. Sometimes it's going to work great, and other times, it isn't going to work at all. As we move into 2024, I hope and pray we continue to lean into the deepest core of who we are as followers of a loving God. May we live out that deep love, joining the Spirit at work among us and within us, building courage among us (and within), and opening ourselves to a sacred belonging for all our weary souls.



Worship, Music & Fine Arts

We are so excited as we look back at the work of Worship, Music, and Fine Arts at First Pres in 2023! We are especially grateful to the many volunteers and the remarkably talented, collaborative, and supportive staff who work diligently to offer the congregation and our community meaningful, inspirational, and authentic worship. The dedicated and hard-working Chancel Choir is 90 voices strong, and the number of participants in the Sanctus Ringers and the Joyful Ringers, our two handbell choirs, are soaring. We have ringers who travel from Livonia and Freeland to ring with us. The Lemon Chapel Singers (K-8, children, and youth) are growing not only in numbers but also in their skills and confidence - many sang solos or were in small groups as a part of Music and Fine Arts Camp this summer.

This summer's Music & Fine Arts Camp was a smashing success with 39 children and youth participants from FPC and the broader community, and 38 volunteers of all ages, from high schoolers to seasoned senior citizens. The Chorister, the national journal of the Choristers Guild, published an article about our camp with a photograph of our kids on the cover! The FPC orchestra is thriving, and new member Michael Haithcock, former director of the U of M Band, is co-directing with Dave VanderMeer.

The congregation and larger community have been very supportive of our ministry area. We welcomed 358 attendees at the All Saints' Concert: Mozart Requiem in November and had 427 in attendance at the Glorious Sounds of Christmas Concert in December. Our monthly Taizé services continue to provide another point of entry for visitors to the church, and the talented Liturgical/Visual Arts Work Group created a new Epiphany Star banner to hang high above the chancel on Epiphany Sunday.

This coming spring and summer, we will offer two more events in our Open Doors Creative Arts Series. On February 18 we will host the National Arab Orchestra Ensemble and an exhibit by Motawi Tileworks in our Social Hall gallery. On April 14 we will host a Violin and Piano concert along with an art exhibit by renowned Chinese artist He Qi. Also in the spring, the Chancel Choir will offer John Rutter's Te Deum during our Easter services.

In the fall of 2023, we began having three worship services:

- 8:30 a.m. (Communion/no music) Monteith Hall
- 9:30 a.m. (Choirs) Sanctuary
- 11:15 a.m. (Creative Worship with piano) Monteith Hall

The overall attendance at FPC in the fall of 2023 has been over 350. The three Christmas Eve Services saw over 1250.

The Worship Ministry is supported by many volunteers: ushers, communion servers and preparers, Sound Technicians/ Videographer, and many more.

We are thrilled to have opened registration for our second annual Music & Fine Arts
Camp, July 29-August 2, and will continue the Jazz Vespers series throughout the summer.
The Holy Spirit is in our midst, and we know that 2024 will be another inspired year of Worship, Music, and Liturgical Art!

- The summer was marked by family BBQs and the inaugural "FPC Tailgating" event in September, a collaborative effort with our Youth Work Group. Partnering with the Music & Fine Arts team, we hosted the Music and Fine Arts camp, fostering creativity and expression.
- This fall, we transitioned back to having children's formation during worship and are grateful for the volunteers who joined the team. We aim to be intentional about the times children join worship,





including First Sundays, the 11:15 service, and holidays. We also partnered with Adult Formation to offer a "Parenting & Sabbath" class and a combined workshop for children/youth, further strengthening our community bonds. We hope to see more of these in 2024.

 December saw a spirited and successful Advent Happening and Christmas Nativity service. The Nativity evolved, becoming a central part of the third Sunday of Advent, inviting all children to spontaneously participate. While our milestone ministry took a pause in the fall, we eagerly anticipate its relaunch in 2024.

Youth and Families

BETSY McCALLISTER Chair

- Bonds within our youth community have been significantly strengthened in 2023.
- Multiple opportunities for connection, relationship-building, faith formation, and engaging conversations were

- offered, such as game nights, book reads, outings, and mission/service opportunities.
- In April, we joyfully confirmed Kaitlyn Cheng, Sebastian Dickinson, Jake Gernant, Lucy Grabowski, and Harper Feyen, celebrating these confirmands with a Youth-led Youth Sunday service. A new confirmation class kicked off in the fall of 2023.
- Two impactful initiatives in 2023 were the revival of the Summer Internship Program and the implementation of a High School Leadership Program. Our summer interns, Chloe Majorprice, Liam Phillips, and Owen Smith, brought fresh perspectives and energy to First Pres. This, coupled with the High School Leadership program, resulted in placing youth on Session, in committees, and in other leadership roles. Both will continue in 2024.
- Over the summer, a group of high school youth embarked on a meaningful service project in Puerto Rico, partnering with the PCUSA Disaster Relief program.







Adult Faith Formation

- At First Pres, Adult Faith Formation takes on various enriching forms. Our Sunday morning offerings at 11 include Exploring the Faith, First Friends, and Bible study. Additionally, active small groups such as Kerygma, T2A2, Journeys Bible Study, and Christian Meditation meet throughout the week, contributing to a diverse and vibrant community.
- Embracing technology, many gatherings are live-streamed and recorded, attracting an average of more than 30 additional views. Looking ahead, our goal is to partner with more groups for future offerings, fostering greater participation and communication.

Resident Ministry

LYNNE LANDE Chair

Our two wonderful Resident Ministers, Nathaniel Fryer and Tommy Langejans, did not magically appear on the doorstep of First Presbyterian Church last August. The pathway to their arrival began more than twenty years ago.

In 2001 First Pres received an initial grant from the Lilly Endowment to establish a Residency Program. The Residency's purpose is to recruit new seminary graduates interested in parish ministry and to offer them a foundation for future work in parish ministry. Since 2001 we have hosted thirty-five Resident Ministers, each for a two-year tenure.

After ten years, the Lilly Endowment began to withdraw financial support for RM programs. Our congregation responded by establishing the Resident Ministry Endowment and raising nearly \$5,000,000. Our goal has been to support the program with earnings from the Endowment. To that end, we reduced the 2023-25 cohort from three Resident Ministers to two.

In early 2023 we began the active recruitment of candidates. Pastor Jay made personal visits and phone calls with Presbyterian and Reformed Church seminaries, renewing his longstanding relationships with presidents and deans. We learned that seminary class size had shrunk

during the pandemic and that there were fewer candidates. To our great good fortune, Tommy and Nathaniel applied. We interviewed them, along with several other applicants, invited three finalists to come for an in-person interview process, and here they are! We relish their presence among us and delight in their talents and growth in ministry.

2023 has been a year of transitions. The 2021-23 cohort of Megan Berry, Hannah Lundberg, and Matthew J. Warfield arrived amid COVID. Matthew J. tragically lost his life to the pandemic in January 2022. In the summer of 2023, Megan accepted her next call to a congregation in Madison, Wisconsin, where she is flourishing. Meanwhile, Jay's retirement as Associate Pastor and Program Coordinator of Resident Ministry was approaching, and we wondered how we would manage without his wisdom, experience, and leadership. Again, to our great good fortune, Hannah agreed to stay and serve as Transitional Pastor for Resident Ministries. Hannah, Dave PH, and a subgroup of the RMWG are working on a vision for the RM program going forward. We trust in God's great goodness and the work of the Holy Spirit among us to ensure the success and future of the Resident Ministry Program.

Mission

JIM SCHAAFSMA Chair

Local Mission

Local mission activity at First Presbyterian is thriving: a testament to this congregation which values mission so greatly. Here are a few key efforts in 2023 where this church had an impact to agencies and nonprofits serving their communities:

- Rotating Shelter provided accommodation for 15 men for 2 weeks in January.
- provided childcare and food and fed all the families at Alpha House for 3 weeks.
- over 150 Thanksgiving food bags filled and delivered to Hope Clinic (more than quadrupling last year's number)
- All Family to Family Christmas families and Fostering Futures youth served
- 15 group meals provided and served for the Friends in Deed Circles program
- Food Rescue Program saving and delivering (dozens of times) many tons of food for those experiencing food insecurity in Detroit.

Food insecurity was also addressed with the monthly First Presbyterian food collection, including delivery and financial support to local organizations.

In addition, First Presbyterian gave financial and volunteer support to:

- Habitat for Humanity House of Faith rehabilitation (200+ volunteer hours), Cass Community Social Services (over 1000 volunteer hours), IHN at Alpha House, Friends in Deed, SOS Community Services, and the Delonis Center.
- On top of all these efforts, First Presbyterian provided financial support to Fort St. Presbyterian's Open Door program in downtown Detroit and the Riverside Community Meal at First Presbyterian in Ypsilanti.

Yes, local mission at First Presbyterian is thriving thanks to a caring and giving church family.



Property

CHRIS KING Chair

The following highlights significant facilities updates and repairs for 2023:

- Heating system:
 - In January, a very old steam valve that served the sanctuary was replaced.
 - □ In December 2022 one of the two circulating pumps failed. Repairs were carried out in January 2023.
 - Fortunately, all boilers made it through our last heating season. As noted in the 2022 report, where possible we have procured duplicates for some of the hard-to-find replacement parts to be ready for any future boiler failures.
- Numerous driveway repairs were completed throughout the summer by Adrian with assistance from Steve Gerhardt. Major work will be required soon due to the deterioration of the base under the pavement.
- The Church's water system received some attention this year. A new main water meter was installed at the sidewalk by the City of Ann Arbor. Two 1990 main water valves were replaced at the new water meter. Catch basins were cleaned in June. Two 40-yearold water fountains in the building were replaced in December.
- Several outdoor maintenance and safety projects were completed over the summer. The stairs leading to the Sanctuary were repaired and caulked. The Memorial Garden knee wall was repaired. Sidewalk cracks were caulked.

- We continue our efforts to reduce our energy usage around the church. This year lights in the French Room, lower level, and 300 level were upgraded to LEDs.
- Our aging roof received some attention this year. Slate roof repairs were completed over the Sanctuary and Lemon wing. Rubber membrane patches were applied over the Kuizenga wing.
- Our wonderful trees continue to be monitored to ensure the safety of those on and around the property.
- As indicated in the Strategic Plan, a building renovation is needed to address some of the larger needs and aspirations of the church. Work continued this year in conjunction with the CapCom Building committee. Concerning HVAC, we have identified and contracted with an engineering firm to define a new system and provide cost estimates. This will include a geothermal option. Please see the CapCom report for additional details.
- Many thanks to Adrian Prundeanu, the Church's Facilities Manager for completing the items listed above as well as all the "behind the scenes" things he takes care of. Next time you see him please give Adrian a "thank you".







Safety

Our Safety Committee has continued its work to improve safety systems within our church. As we assessed both the physical and human resource needs related to safety this past year, our committee relied on the expertise of our Sunday security guard, Ed Boguskewski, and our parish nurses, Barb DeLancey and Stacey Pakela. We improved our ability to communicate effectively by increasing the use of walkie-talkies by safety team members, facilitating additional usher training, and labeling our exterior doors following the Ann Arbor Emergency Manager's directive. Please note and use these door numbers to guide others - including emergency services - to a specific location when needed. Our committee is also working with the Property Committee to address the need for more handicapped parking. We are grateful to Session for enthusiastically approving additional spaces.

In the year ahead, we have identified the need for effective information sharing and collaboration with our church membership and are planning to increase training opportunities for staff, ushers, teachers, and lay leadership. Additional safety communication tools are also being designed. Please make a note to look at the new Emergency Information Card that is being placed in the pews for easy access to shelter-in-place and evacuation information. Session has also approved adding one security guard to assist on Sundays and during special services in 2024. We look forward to growing our congregation's awareness of important safety measures here at church and in the wider community as the year unfolds. As always, our congregation's safety is our primary concern and we're grateful to be able to serve First Pres in this way.

Personnel

JEAN SONG Chair

The focus of the Personnel Committee was to establish a right-sized model for church staffing and a sustainable budget. As part of this strategy, several positions were modified. Campus Ministry's dedicated positions are being deferred for fulfillment while it is currently being re-evaluated to consider a maximal approach to creating a robust and sustainable campus ministry program through the leading efforts of Associate Pastor, Mark Mares. The Coordinator of Children & Family Ministry was reduced to a part-time position which was filled by Heather Polikoff and then additionally supplemented by an hourly position for Charlotte Sawtell. The committee is also using staffing attrition (such as the retirement of Associate Pastor, Jay Sanderford) to re-evaluate the distribution of job responsibilities. In this case, the Associate Pastor position will not be replaced with another individual but rather responsibilities will be shifted and re-imagined. The committee continues to foster secular leadership including the creation and recruitment of an Executive Administrator position. The committee is in the process of finalizing a job description for the position with the hopes of beginning recruitment early in 2024. The committee's

overall goals are to have fewer but purposeful positions that are well compensated to ensure recruitment and retention while also maintaining sustainability in the personnel budget. The committee also continued its efforts to evaluate individuals in their work practices to ensure individuals are clear about their work expectations and establish healthy management practices.

The Personnel Committee also continues to foster a culture of healthy work/life balance expectations. With these intentions, the committee was able to bring forward additional paid days off in 2023. In addition, by request from the Diversity, Inclusion, Accessibility, and Accountability Committee, an additional holiday, Juneteenth, was permanently added.

Administratively, the Personnel Committee has worked to create effective documentation of its practices including the creation of a Google shared drive for all committee documents (minutes, budget, position descriptions, etc.), the creation of a Personnel Committee Chair's manual, strategic vision document, annual goals document and the revision of the Personnel Manual.

Congregational Nominating

In 2023, the Capital Campaign Steering Committee (CapCom) and its work groups worked to put the pieces in place for the future success of First Pres. We look forward to substantial progress in the upcoming year.

FINANCE

Stewardship

STEVE MCKENNY Financial Stewardship Chair

Financial Stewardship is responsible for overseeing investments and spending, counting offerings, running the annual giving campaign, proposing the annual operating budget, and promoting the legacy giving program.

During 2023 we had the support of 27 volunteers and several staff members, primarily finance manager Anna Miller. Volunteers primarily assisted in the finance office (since the finance assistant position was eliminated), counted weekly offerings, and helped with the annual giving campaign.

Endowment & Special Gifts (E&SG) Funds:

We started the year with a balance of about \$7.7 million and ended with \$8.7 million. Of these amounts \$4.3 million is endowment (generating earnings but not available to be spent).

The church applied for and received an employee retention tax credit that was available since we retained staff during the required covid shutdown during 2020. We received \$528,486 net of filing fees, which is currently in our undesignated E&SG account.

2023 Operating Budget:

Income for 2023 was above budget, and spending was under budget, so our operating budget deficit for the year was far lower than the budget amount (budgeted deficit: \$211,142).

2024 Operating Budget:

The 2024 operating budget has modest increases for several ministry areas, and more fully funds mission than budgets from the prior two years. It has no built-in draw from our unrestricted E&SG funds, but has a projected deficit of \$37,940, so it is possible that some draw will be needed at the end of the year. Some costs are higher in the early months of 2024 than the later months so the budget takes us closer to our strategic plan objective of achieving a balanced budget in 2025.

Legacy Partners:

We celebrate the addition of ten people to the list of those who have informed us that they have included the church in their will, bringing the total to 168 partners (118 families).

2023 Congregational Meeting Minutes

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION

Sunday, February 26, 2023

(The Annual Meeting of the Congregation, immediately following the 9:30 service was conducted in-person with livestreaming available.)

The Annual Meeting of the Congregation as required by the Book of Order (G-1.0501) was approved for this date by Session at its January 25, 2023, Stated Meeting. (Ref: Page 194). Notice was given to the congregation on two consecutive Sunday's prior in according with the By Laws of First Presbyterian Church

Rev. David Prentice-Hyers (Moderator) welcomed all who were in attendance in the Sanctuary and those listening via livestreaming. He said technology challenges did not support interactive participation for those viewing online; however, questions could be posted in the chat function and would be addressed.

Rev. Melissa Anne Rogers offered the Gathering Liturgy.

Call to Order: Rev. David Prentice-Hyers called the Meeting to order at 10:45 a.m.

Recognition of the Clerk: The Moderator introduced the Clerk of Session, Linda Rex, to serve as Secretary for the Annual Meeting. With 194 persons in attendance, the Clerk declared a quorum was present.

Approval of Minutes

The Moderator ask for a vote to allow the Session to approve the Minutes of the Annual Meeting, with all in favor signifying by Aye, opposed Nay. Hearing no objections, the request to allow Session to approve the Minutes was granted.

Opening Prayer

Rev. Megan Berry gave the Opening Prayer.

BUSINESS OF THE DAY

Terms of Call*

Rev. David Prentice-Hyers noted the following changes to the Terms of Call:

- All salaries will receive the mandated Board of Pensions increases for 2023
- Revs. David Prentice-Hyers and Mark Mares salaries will remain otherwise unchanged due to the recent onboarding of himself and Rev. Mares' installation as Associate Pastor in 2022
- Revs. Melissa Anne Rogers and Jay Sanderford will receive 5% Cost-of-Living increase
- Rev. Jay Sanderford's previous additional salary as Acting Moderator of Session has been rescinded

The Moderator asked for a Motion to approve the Terms of Call. So moved by Sandy Herold; second by Randall Nicholls.

The Moderator then asked if there were questions. Hearing none, a vote was called on the Motion. Results: Yes, 188, Opposed 0. Motion carried and the Terms of Call were approved.

Prayers of the People

Rev. Mark Mares offered a prayer of the unity of all people embracing and being embraced in God's love.

Presentation of 2023 Budget**

Rev. Prentice-Hyers introduced Brent Ivey, a member of the Budget Task Force approved by Session in December to (Ref: Page 197) to address the current financial crossroad at First Pres. The Task Force, comprised of Dick Carlisle, Jennifer Day (current Elder), Brent Ivey, and Pat Tamblyn spent many hours discerning - and praying - how to "right the financial ship" and place it on a steady course of fiscal stability and sustainability. Concurrently, the work of the Task Force included a plan to allow First Presbyterian Church to achieve a balanced budget in 2025 as prescribed in the Strategic Plan.

Brent Ivey proceeded to explain how the Task Force approached its challenge, which included -

- Clarifying priority spending (core ministries, requisite spending) and how they are funded,
- Identifying short-term personnel reductions, and
- Addressing longer-term operating efficiencies

He spoke of the need to be mindful of how we spend our resources and recognize the need to support the ministries and spirit of First Pres in the world. Our financial resources are gifts from God and in gratitude, we must use them to spread His Word and love.

Ministry at First Presbyterian Church Ann Arbor

Rev. Prentice-Hyers spoke of the same financial crises being felt by many churches and in response we must reenvision how we do stewardship and ministry. He outlined some of the plans being considered to address these needs.

In 2023 --

- Rev. Jay Sanderford will be transitioning to a modified role and areas of responsibility
- Rev. Melissa Anne Rogers will be encouraged to take a long-overdue sabbatical
- Rev. Mark Mares' role and scope of responsibilities will be expanded
- David VanderMeer, in conjunction with the Core Leadership Team, will continue to explore opportunities for enhanced worship experiences through music and liturgical art and improved administrative work flows.

- When Rev. Sanderford retires (early 2024), a replacement will not be called for his position
- The position held by Rev. Evans McGowan will not be filled in the short-term. It is being "frozen" which will allow First Pres to fill the position when appropriate. The plan is to resource campus ministry differently by rolling it into Faith Formation. However, prior to that migration it is necessary to examine and decide how campus ministry can best be supported at First Presbyterian Church over the next year.

Rev. Prentice-Hyers emphasized that ministry will look different, not business as usual. Yet, our Mission remains firm. We are in a season of transformation and he encouraged members to be engaged and support Staff and each other as we move to this new season of ministry.

He gave special recognition to Resident Ministers Megan Berry and Hannah Lundberg for their energy and engagement. They are a model of action in service to God.

Rev. Prentice-Hyers then opened the floor to questions.

Questions / Comments

(Questions from the floor centered on funding for Mission, Resident Ministry Endowment, and DIAA.)

- Local Mission Funding. Concerns were raised regarding the reduced funding in the 2023 Budget for Local Mission and how this would affect recipients of those funds? Rev. Prentice-Hyers (DP-H): Funding for Local Mission has been removed from the 2023 Operating Budget but
 - will be supplanted by Designated Funds. This is a temporary move (2023 only) as part of the steps necessary to move to a balanced budget by 2025. This funding shift from the Operating Budget to Designated Funds will have zero impact on the actual distribution of money to our mission partners.
- Resident Ministry Endowment. Members asked how this fiscal constraint would impact the Resident Ministry
 - DP-H: The Resident Ministry program is funded solely from the Resident Ministry Endowment. While it is not impacted by operational budget reductions, it is subject to fluctuating financial market conditions which does affect how can be drawn on a yearly basis. Interviewing is underway for the next group of residents, which will be a minimum of two, and possibly three.
- 3. DIAA. It was pointed out that the budget did not detail any funding for DIAA to support the strategies for diversity and inclusion outlined in the Strategic Plan. How do we include implementation of these plans in our budget calculations? Going forward, we need to be more purposeful and direct to achieve our goals. DP-H: We are not as explicit as we need to be. With the re-engagement of the Strategic Plan Committee, we need to move to empower DIAA to take actions rather than to merely report. It will be a priority to move in this
- Philippines Mission Team. Does the absence of the Philippines Mission Task Force from the list of Mission Spending indicate that First Pres no longer supports this outreach to the Philippines? Rev. Jay Sanderford responded this omission was an oversight and confirmed the Philippines mission work is an active program.

With no further questions, the Moderator called for a Motion to adjourn following the Benediction. So moved by Tom Brandt; second by Brent Ivey.

The Moderator called for a vote with all those in favor signifying by Aye; opposed Nay. Hearing no objections, the Motion carried.

Rev. Hannah Lundberg gave the Closing Prayer.

Following the Benediction (The Selkirk Grace) delivered by Rev. Prentice-Hyers, the meeting adjourned at 11:45 a.m.
