PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

FIRST SCRIPTURE READING Psalm 32

People whose sins are forgiven are happy people.

When the Lord says,

This season of Lent we join together as a community in faith, building love and support for all as we seek ways to turn wilderness into welcome. Our first scripture reading each week will be in the form of a responsive reading. Many of these readings come from *God's Word, My Voice: A Lectionary for Children*, in our continued growth as a church to invite us into unity – one body of Christ. These adapted readings create an entrypoint of biblical understanding for our younger readers, while still wrapping us in the comfort of God's Word with which we are familiar.

WELCOME TO WORSHIP!

Wilderness | Welcome is our theme for Lenten worship. Each Sunday we will wrestle with Scripture passages that deal with questions of hospitality, loneliness, discovery, loss, and hope in the midst of wilderness moments. Many of us have been living in the wilderness for far too long. This Lent, we enter our third year of pandemic life with losses and hard realities all around us. Often, as we navigate these places of uncertainty and pain, our first instinct is to turn inward and to clench our fists until we can make it to the other side. Our faith invites us to a different response: one where fear leads us to turn toward one another, to rely on God's presence, to build love and support for all, and to trust that we do not journey on difficult roads alone. God calls us to welcome the wilderness and to turn wilderness into welcome.

Our guest preacher today, Daniel Ervin, was a well-loved Resident Minister here at First Pres from 2015 to 2017, serving alongside Revs. Emily Béghin and Angela Ryo in a diverse cohort of young pastors.
