# Advent Paper-lace

**Banners** were designed by liturgical artist Ellen Phillips and were cut by members of First Pres.

The banners for the first week of Advent reflect the hope that the Messiah will come and that the darkness will fade. The only thing that can be identified are the rays of a slowly rising sun.

The banners for the second week of Advent refer to The Peaceable Kingdom in which a gentle lion embraces a happy lamb as a cow peers over the lion's shoulder.

The third Sunday of Advent is about gladness and joy. The stars seem to dance and sprouts of water spray out over the desert in an expression of total joy felt by the redeemed as well as by the very earth itself.

On the fourth Sunday of Advent, the figure of Mary, ready to give birth, is front and center. This birth, this physical incarnation of God with us, celebrates the fullness of God's love. With Mary, we all anticipate the coming Messiah.
