



Her ancestors had long awaited the coming of the Messiah. but it was Marv who first awaited the coming of Jesus. And, according to the Gospel of Luke, as she waited, Mary shared with her cousin Elizabeth the song we call the Magnificat. One beloved interpretation of Mary's song is known as My Soul Cries Out with a Joyful Shout (Canticle of the Turning), Hymn #100 in our hymnal and this year's Advent theme borrows from its imagery and poetry. The God we await in Advent is the same God whom Mary awaited 2,000 years ago: it is Christ who is turning the world around.

The Advent Wreath, consists of four candles on a wreath of evergreen, is shaped in a perfect circle to symbolize the eternity of God. At First Presbyterian we use three blue candles with one candle being rose or pink, to represent joy (usually the Third Sunday of Advent) with one larger white candle in the middle as the Christ candle.

For the world is about to turn.






