Children's Ministry Opportunities:



Summary:

The year is 1960. Six-year-old Ruby Bridges and her family have recently moved from Mississippi to New Orleans in search of a better life. When a judge orders Ruby to attend first grade at an all-white school, Ruby must face angry mobs of parents who refuse to send their children to school with her. This is the story of Ruby's courage, faith, and hope.



Questions for Parents and Kids:

1. What part does the church play in Ruby's family life?
2. What part does prayer play in preparing Ruby for school?
3. Try to imagine what it would be like to walk through an angry mob shouting at you each day. What feelings would you have?
4. Find Luke 23:24 in the Bible. Ruby modeled her prayer after this Bible verse.
