Musicians providing music leadership for today's worship (9:30/11:00) include Tom Trenney, guest organist and director; Chancel Choir; and singers from *sounding light*.

We welcome guest organist and director Tom Trenney to our 9:30 and 11:00 a.m. services today. Tom serves as Minister of Music to First-Plymouth Congregational Church (UCC), Lincoln, Nebraska, guiding four adult choirs, accompanying the congregation on the magnificent Lied Organ, leading First-Plymouth's music outreach through Abendmusik, and even preaching for worship services. Tom is also on the choral faculty at Doane College as conductor of the Women's Chorale, and he continues as Music Director of *sounding light* - a chamber choir which he founded in 2003 in Southeastern Michigan. Tom is a graduate of the Cleveland Institute of Music and the Eastman School of Music.

Tom has been featured as performer and teacher at regional and national conventions of the American Guild of Organists, the American Choral Directors Association, the Choristers Guild, the Organ Historical Society, the Presbyterian Association of Musicians, the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians, National Pastoral Musicians, the Fellowship of United Methodists in Music and Worship Arts, and the Calvin Institute of Worship. His choral compositions are published by Augsburg Fortress, and his recordings appear on the Pro Organo and Raven labels. Known for his engaging improvisations on hymns, silent films, scripture, poetry, and artwork, Tom became the first organist to be awarded First Prize and Audience Prize in the American Guild of Organists' (AGO) National Competition in Organ Improvisation in 2006.

We also welcome singers from *sounding* light who are singing with our Chancel Choir this morning. The chamber choir *sounding* light gave a concert last night here in our sanctuary, and they are repeating the same concert this afternoon at First United Methodist Church, Plymouth.

HOLY WEEK WORSHIP

Palm Sunday worship is March 29, at 8:00 a.m. and at 7:07 p.m. in Monteith Hall, and at 9:30 and 11:00 a.m. in the Sanctuary.

Children gather for the Palm Sunday Procession in the Social Hall at 9:20 a.m. for the 9:30 worship service or at 10:50 a.m. for the 11:00 worship service. The children enter the Sanctuary on the opening hymn.

Maundy Thursday worship is April 2, at 10:30 a.m. at Glacier Hills in the Hanson Room and at 7:30 p.m. in the Sanctuary.

Maundy Thursday commemorates the Last Supper, and is the time when the discipline of Lent is concluded with forgiveness. Jesus' love for all people is shown by his service to others, as well as in his gift of himself for our salvation. All are welcome to worship with our older members at Glacier Hills. The evening service is a family-friendly service.

Good Friday worship is April 3, at 7:30 p.m. in the Sanctuary.

On Good Friday, we emphasize a time of reflection, intercession, and adoration of Christ as the sacrificial lamb. This Tenebrae service, a somber service of shadows conducted in a darkened church, commemorates the suffering and death of Christ.

Easter Sunday worship is April 5 with five worship services.

The days of fasting and reflection in Lent are over. The celebration begins! Christ is risen; he is risen indeed!

Sunrise worship is at 6:45 a.m. on the Circle Terrace, weather permitting, or in Monteith Hall. This is a 30-minute service led by our resident ministers.

Traditional worship services are at 8:00, 9:30, and 11:00 a.m. in the Sanctuary.

Rev. Dr. Fair will preach. Musical leadership includes Chancel Choir, brass quintet, organ, and timpani. The services will end with the congregation singing Handel's *Hallelujah* chorus.

A new offering this year is for those for whom a less-crowded worship experience is preferred. **A worship service at 10:00 a.m. in Monteith Hall** will be led by Rev. Roederer. This service will include a sermon and music led by a soloist.

Please note that there is not a 7:07 worship service on Easter.

Please make considerate parking choices to leave open as many spaces near the church as possible for people with mobility issues. Handicapped spaces will be designated in the parking lot on the Hillegonds Chapel side of the church. Parking is permitted on Washtenaw and Hill Streets on Sunday mornings and free parking is available in the nearby parking structure at 650 S. Forest Avenue.

Bring fresh flowers to add to our Flowering Crosses located outside the Sanctuary on the front steps and in the Monteith Hall vestibule. Store-bought flowers are welcome!

Easter lilies will grace the Nave on Easter Sunday. Sign up in the Church Office or on our website by Monday, March 30, at 5:00 p.m., to donate a lily in memory or honor of a loved one. The cost is \$17. After Easter worship, our deacons will deliver the lilies to members and friends of our congregation who are ill, grieving, or shut in.

Easter morning fellowship is 7:15–8:00 a.m. in the Narthex with hot cross buns and Fair Trade coffee, and 9:30–10:00 a.m. outside Monteith Hall with Easter refreshments and Fair Trade coffee.

Sunday School classes do not meet on Easter Sunday. Childcare, for crib through young five-year-olds, is available at 8:00 a.m., **by reservation only**, and at 9:30, 10:00 and 11:00 a.m., no reservations needed.

All women are invited to the Presbyterian Women March Gathering on Wednesday, March 18. The event begins at 9:30 a.m., with Bible study followed by a presentation by Rev. Rodawla on “Christian Minorities in Myanmar.” Lunch (\$7) in the Social Hall follows the presentation. Contact the Church Office to register for lunch.
