Notes by composer Daniel Elder on Reproaches:

For over a millennium the Improperia texts have been used in liturgies to bring life to the Passion story on Good Friday, and in this modern setting the Reproaches are treated with a newly intimate and evocative tone to better tell this story through Jesus' eyes. A modern English paraphrase lends succinctness to the tone. Two choirs are used, as is customary in the chant fashion, yet rather than performing purely antiphonal cantor roles these bodies interact both alternately and simultaneously to create particular spatial effects. The organ is used both as an outline of the voices and as a recollection of the ancient chant source, as this Gregorian chant can be heard occasionally in interludes throughout the piece. From the beginning, Choir I can be heard 'ascending the hill' in a gradual crescendo of emotion, climaxing on repeated monosyllabic exclamations of "O My people" (echoed into space by Choir II) to evoke the sound of hammer strokes. Rather than using the traditional chant forms, Choir I speaks the ensuing lines in a direct, almost blunt, bitterness, waxing and waning as a gradual arc of rage and submission colors the progression of these verses. In the latter half of the work, their long decrescendo forms an increasingly trance-like texture, and the refrains by Choir II ("Holy is God!") are increasingly blended with Choir I's incantations. Finally, all reproaches uttered, the choirs merge to sing the closing hymn "Crux Fidelis," traditionally included at the end of the Improperia, granting a final and elegiac peace.


