

Lois Nissly Honored for Habitat Leadership

The work on the 2016 Habitat for Humanity House of Faith will honor Lois Nissly in recognition of her vision, service, and leadership to both First Presbyterian Church and Huron Valley Habitat for Humanity. A member of First Pres since 1989, Lois was instrumental in re-igniting our connection with our local Habitat chapter six years ago and spurring the church toward an annual renovation of a Habitat home for a local family. Six Habitat houses have been renovated by First Pres volunteers and purchased by local families because of this vision for affordable housing. Lois served our local Huron Valley Habitat for Humanity as a board member, as interim executive director, and was one of the founding members of the Habitat ReStore program.



The 2016 Habitat House of Faith will be rehabbed by First Pres volunteers in April and May, drawing upon the financial support of our congregation. It will be dedicated in June for the L. Riggs family. The Local Mission Team and Mission Committee thank Lois Nissly for her vision of creating safe, warm, and dry homes for local families, built out of the compassion and generosity of the First Pres congregation and our partners at Habitat.

News from Niger

We are safe and sound again this month despite the tension across Niger within their election process. We were warned to stay at home the day the results were announced because of opposition protests. Community Health Evangelism (CHE) planning is moving better as we've been able to have more discussions with the key leaders here. We need to find some good solutions on how to bring the training to Niger, maintaining the integrity of the sustainable, community-based approach, and gaining people's trust and excitement. The news is good about the rickshaw project. The funds have just arrived in Niger and we hear they will buy



rickshaws next week! This month has been good for our family as the adoption of the four-year-old boy is moving forward, and we're still discerning what a second adoption might look like for us. In the next few weeks we're faced with the transition to the "hot" dry season and even less water. As we go through more transitions we are very thankful for you all and how you continue to pray for us and offer your financial support.

EASTERTIDE - A Time to Move Forward

From Easter to Pentecost, the disciples discussed what had happened to Jesus, often while they were walking somewhere.

"Now that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem. They were talking with each other about everything that had happened. As they talked and discussed these things with each other, Jesus himself came up and walked along with them ..." (Luke 24:13-15) You might notice, they didn't take their car, the bus or even Uber. They walked. They moved their bodies, and that's what we're going to do this Eastertide. To help get us going, Adult Ed and Parish Nursing are teaming up to provide some incentives and opportunities for you to 'move'.

From Pentecost to Easter (50 days), we'll be encouraging everyone – young/old, boy/girl, mom/dad, working/retired – to move and keep track of your 'journey'. Whether you walk, run, bike, swim, or just go from your sitting room to the dining room, keep track of your steps or your distance. Turn in your numbers on Sunday mornings during Coffee Hour. We'll be tracking how far our congregation walks during these 50 days of Eastertide. There will be weekly walks you can participate in, or team up with a friend, or just move on your own. Every step will count in our journey from "Jerusalem to Ann Arbor": J2A2 – a distance of over 7,000 miles.

News of weekly walks will be available on our website, in the weekly church email, and in the bulletin. Our 'miles' will be tracked on the wall starting on the 4th floor, traveling down the hall, then the stairs, and ... well, we'll see how far we get! Please help us get from Jerusalem 2 Ann Arbor!

With the foundation of the Log Cabin in 1726 (which would later become Princeton University), Presbyterians in what is now the United States effectively established a tradition of coupling higher education with faith formation. First Pres has continued that tradition and been a presence in and around the University of Michigan since 1866 with the chartering of the Tappan Hall Association.
