Dear Friends,

This summer we have gathered around the theme "emerge," considering how God might be calling us to respond to the world and one another in new ways, to reach out to neighbors across boundaries of difference, to stretch past our comfort zones, and to expand our imaginations as we continue growing into this new season

of life at First Pres. In a metaphorical sense, we're moving outdoors, feeling the wind around us, and trusting that God goes with us even when things feel uncertain.

We're emerging through some big transitions. We welcomed Rev. Dave Prentice-Hyers as our new lead pastor and are

getting to know the family that our refugee resettlement group is partnering with as they are resettled from Afghanistan. Some of us have lost loved ones, moved through big changes in our work or personal lives, and grappled with the realities of gun violence and justice disparities in our country and world. If you need to catch your breath outside amid it all, I'll gladly join you.

Beyond that, I hope you'll find time this month to connect with God in the great outdoors even outside a formal worship setting. Meet a friend for a walk after church, come enjoy time at the picnic tables on the front lawn, or simply take a few extra breaths the next time you walk out the front door. God is here. Through highs, lows, and everything in between.

NEWS FROM YOUR FAITH FORMATION TEAM

Rev. Mark Mares, Rev. Megan Berry, and Beca Torres-Davenport

(From Mark Mares) This month, a group of youth will travel to Speculator, New York, for a week at Camp Fowler, a Christian Camp associated with the PCUSA, RCA, and UCC denominations. I had fallen in love with Camp Fowler a few years back, when I volunteered to serve as a chaplain with a friend and colleague in ministry while I was serving in New York. Camp Fowler is "a Christian children's camp that practices a compassionate Christianity that is grounded in openness and hospitality." During the summer, there is a different theme each week for different ages and groups to attend.

One night during my stay, I had a conversation with the Camp Director. He mentioned that following our week, the camp would be hosting an Islamic faith community. The camp staff would run the week like any other, with all the normal programming, but the leaders of the Islamic community would lead their times of prayer and teaching. Following that week, they'd host another group from New York City, a non-profit organization that works with and empowers young women of color, but because it receives state-funding, they don't have any prayer services.

One might ask, how can a Christian organization host two groups without "proclaiming" the gospel? The reality is that by opening their space to people who might be perceived as "the other," they are living into their call to be a people of hospitality, a people shaped by the love of Jesus by sharing in the love of the Triune God. I can't wait to introduce our youth to Camp Fowler, and the spirit of love, fellowship, community, and welcome that they inhabit.

I really believe good camps can be transformational—life changing, even! But there are other practices that ground us and do the inner work of transformation. As we enter the last weeks of summer, I wonder what practices are grounding us.

Here are some suggestions and opportunities to center yourself and faith practices:

Something to listen to: The Invitation Podcast – 5 minute prayer with Josh Banner. Josh is a friend of Pastor Mark, and his spiritual director who runs the Invitation Center, a place that seeks to help train people to walk alongside others creating time and space for God. In this episode, Josh teaches us a unique way of entering into prayer. <u>Listen to this episode</u> and then check out Season 4 of Faith Beats this fall as we'll be hosting Josh for a conversation.

Something to watch: Ms. Marvel on Disney+ — This is a new show from Marvel Studios that's a coming-of-age story that follows a young Pakistani-American Muslim girl in New Jersey, as she becomes a superhero. It's a heartwarming story that threads history, culture, faith, and superhero shenanigans in a unique way. Watch it and come find Pastor Mark to chat about it!

Something to read: Beca had the opportunity to attend a workshop with Prof. Karen-Marie Yust, during the Association of Partners in Christian Education conference this past February. She was so engaged with her lecture that she couldn't wait to read more on her website, Real Kids Real Faith. She frequently goes back to her website to peruse the articles—sometimes for herself, as a parent, and other times like today, as an offering to families. In mid-June, Beca's family had the opportunity to attend the "Immersive Van Gogh" experience at the Lighthouse ArtSpace in Detroit. Completely worth going and experiencing both rooms if you haven't yet gone! It was wonderful to watch her children's engagement with art and music. Real Kids Real Faith offers this practice to encourage spiritual connections with self and the natural world. As many of you have been or will be traveling this summer, use this practice not only in artistic images, but in scenery you may come across in your travels. We look forward to having Prof. Yust visit as a guest speaker at First Pres later this year. Stay tuned for upcoming information.

STEPHEN MINISTRY

After Mike retired 6 months ago, he and his wife, Tia, sold the home they had lived in for 37 years and moved to a warmer part of the country. Mike was ecstatic because he was playing golf 5 days a week. Tia missed her old home, her daily routine, her close group of friends. She was also feeling angry with Mike because he had pushed for this move despite her objections. Now he was perfectly happy, and she was perfectly miserable. Tia spoke with her new pastor about her struggle, and after listening to her, the pastor suggested that Tia might benefit from a Stephen Minister. The next day a Stephen Ministry Leader named Jane met with her. Jane explained to Tia how Stephen Ministry works and arranged for Tia to begin meeting with a Stephen Minister, Ann. The first time they met, it was as if an emotional fire hydrant had been opened. Tia talked freely about her painful




feelings. After the visit, Tia was shocked that she had been so open and honest with a stranger and wondered who else now knew about her struggle to adjust. The next day she saw Jane at the grocery store and tried to avoid her, but Jane walked over to her and asked if her Stephen Minister had been in touch with her. Tia replied that they had met yesterday and said, "I thought that she would have reported all the details to you by now." Jane looked confused and then reminded her that everything she shared with her Stephen Minister is confidential, that Stephen Ministers are carefully trained and even the little they share in supervision is done without names or personal references, so no one else will know that she has a Stephen Minister. Jane's words calmed Tia's worst fears.

This month we are highlighting What Was Lost: A Christian Journey through Miscarriage, by Elise Erikson Barrett. Reverend Elise Erikson Barrett finished this thoughtful, well-written book dealing with the aftermath of miscarriages. She tells her personal story to assist other women with their grief journey. Also, she shares stories of other women who share this loss. "Where is God in our suffering?" A thoughtful, theological guide to help others discover a path forward to remain in a relationship with God. Reverend Barrett has practical advice as well: how to tell others, dealing with insensitive comments, and grieving this private loss. Included at the end of each chapter are reflection questions as well as an outlined exercise. The last chapter contains many resources including other books, traditional and contemporary hymns, worship and memorial services. The book title, "What Was Lost," comes from a hymn written by Dietrich Bon-



hoeffer, while he was a prisoner in Nazi Germany, knowing that sharing a loss with community can be a valuable part of healing. Hopefully, reading this book could ease your mind as well as your heart.

Learn with Stephen Ministers: September on FORGIVENESS

Stephen Ministry welcomes you to their monthly continuing education seminar! On Monday, September 12, from 7–8 p.m. in Montieth Hall, our speaker will be Dr. Jennifer Griggs, MD, who will present: "Letting Go of Past Hurts: Forgiveness as a

Path to Peace." Jennifer says: It is hard to go through life without being hurt. Our stories of the ways in which our dignity has been violated range from the quotidian frustrations we face or massive trauma. We may also wish to forgive ourselves to untether from regret. Many of us want to let go of the pain of the past and to forgive others, but we don't know how or where to start. This presentation will describe an evidence-based, trauma-informed approach to forgiveness, including self-forgiveness, using a framework of dignity, empathy for self and others, and help us become more forgiving people. Jennifer Griggs, MD, MPH, is a physician and Professor of Medicine and Health Management and Policy at the University of Michigan. She is an oncologist with a clinical and research focus on patient-clinician communication and quality of care. She is also a personal and leadership coach, helping people live and lead with joy and purpose. Jennifer and her husband Steve live in Petersburg, Michigan, and have two daughters, Phoebe and Libby, who both live in Ann Arbor. All are welcome!

REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT

The First Pres refugee resettlement group has been preparing for many months to welcome a refugee family through the co-sponsorship program run through Jewish Family Services of Washtenaw County. In mid-June, we were finally paired with a family: a mother and two children arriving from Afghanistan to reunite with their husband/ father who was resettled in Washtenaw County several years ago. Since June, we have slowly gotten to know this family, sharing time, laughter, and community while helping them to get established with an apartment, enrollment in ESL classes, connection to healthcare, and more. First Pres will be partners with this family until June 2023, assisting them with many of the needs and challenges that arise in the first year after being resettled as a refugee. Social Justice Action Group

In May, devastated by the shootings in Uvalde, Texas, Buffalo, New York, and so many other places throughout our country, the Social Justice Action Group supported an effort to adorn the First Pres grounds with orange ribbons in honor of those who were killed, and to call attention to the ongoing tragedy of gun violence in our nation. You may have seen the 21 chairs placed along Washtenaw Avenue in memory of the 21 individuals who were killed at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, Texas. What you may not have known is that each of the 68 ribbons placed around the church grounds also bore the name of an individual killed in a mass shooting



during the month of May. As each of these ribbons were put up and later removed, we said a prayer for each community impacted by these unjust and horrific deaths. Trusting in a God who comforts us in our fear, but also calls us to fight for justice, the Social Justice Action Group hopes to do more in the year to come to stand against gun violence and promote safer policies and practices.

Local Mission Grant Program Distributes \$75,000 to Local Organizations

Through the Local Mission Grant program, the congregation Makes God's Love Visible to our vulnerable neighbors. The organizations we support provide both basic needs for the short term as well as resources which potentially allow people to improve their circumstances for the long term. Our team this year included: Bill Black, Nikki Black, Beth Gerwig, Ruth Jensen, Tom McKarns, Gale Redding, Gary Stahl, John Voorhorst, Felicity Williams, and Martha Kershaw (coordinator).

After consulting updated local community needs resources, we decided to solicit applications for the same priority areas as in 2021: Access to Shelter/Stable Housing; Access to Mental Health/ Substance Abuse Treatment; and Moving People Out of Poverty.

We received 18 applications and approved funding for 14 of them, for a total of \$75,000. Those receiving grants are:

- Dawn Farm: Scholarship Fund for Addiction Treatment

- Hope Clinic: Psychiatry services for un-insured patients
- IHN at Alpha House: Shelter and Support for homeless families
- Interfaith Council for Peace and Justice: Warrant Resolution Project
- Ozone House: Mental Health Program
- SafeHouse: Fresh Start Fund
- Shelter Assn. Washtenaw County: Mental Health Case Worker
- SOS Community Service: Rapid Rehousing for homeless families

RESIDENT MINISTER FLASHBACK

Rev. Jenny McDevitt

"Where do you see yourselves in ten years?' I asked Jenny McDevitt and Sarah Wiles over lunch just before they finished their residency at FPC in 2011. Sarah was boldly confident in her answer: "I'll be a head of staff." Jenny was not so sure at that moment but agreed she also would be a leader. Her path in ministry has traversed the country from Virginia, to Kansas, to New York City, to her current call as Senior Pastor and Head of Staff of Shandon Presbyterian Church in Columbia, South Carolina.
