## Dear Friends,

The Letter to the Hebrews says, “Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.” The Foundations of Presbyterian Polity include the declaration, “There is an inseparable connection between faith and practice, truth and duty.” Prolific Presbyterian author Frederick Buechner writes, “Faith is better understood as a verb than as a noun, as a process than as a possession.” Each of these statements is true and each hits on a different facet of what faith is. As Presbyterians we believe that faith is a gift of God. We believe that the Holy Spirit stirs faith within us. We also believe that our faith is strengthened by gathering with one another for worship, study, service, and fellowship.

A key role of First Pres is to nurture the faith of all those with whom we interact – whether it is through teaching young children “Jesus Loves Me,” allowing youth to put faith into practice through the construction of a church or a school in Central America, providing in-depth Bible studies for adults, or ministering to men who depend on First Pres and other Ann Arbor churches to be a sanctuary from the

coldest nights of the year. Faith deepens as we acknowledge God’s working in our lives. Faith strengthens as we give God gratitude for the awareness of God’s presence with us. Faith is magnified when we know God’s peace in the midst of difficulty.

February at First Pres provides many opportunities to deepen and strengthen your faith. All four Sundays will have a special worship emphasis, we will have two services on Ash Wednesday, and, on Wednesday evenings beginning February 25, we will offer a communal meal, followed by the opportunity to engage in study and reflection on the Psalm text to be used the next Sunday in worship.

Faith is a rich blessing.

*Two Psalm Study Group Times – 5:15 to 6:00 p.m. and 6:40 to 7:30 p.m.*


On Wednesday evenings in Lent, join us for Lenten Suppers and Psalm Study. Come for a soup, salad, and bread dinner (with special food for kiddos) at 6:00 p.m. in the Social Hall. From 6:40 - 7:30 p.m., take your dessert to an assigned room for a small group discussion about the Psalm of the week. Prefer an early evening? There is an "early bird" Psalm study group scheduled for 5:15 to 6:00 p.m. for those that wish to attend earlier. A pastor will lead your discussion group, which will focus on scriptural study and deepening fellowship. The psalm and topic we will discuss will be the focus of the next Sunday's sermon. Children's activities will be held during the discussion time. The program is \$6 each Wednesday, or \$30 for the five-part series. Families pay no more than \$100 total.

All who attend dinner are encouraged to participate in a discussion group. If you usually come only for the meal, this will add only a half-hour on to your evening, and the spiritual discipline of psalm study during Lent will enhance the season and deepen your faith. **Please register ahead of time as you will be assigned to a discussion group.** *Note: Children's choir rehearsals proceed as normal at 5:15 p.m.*




## Sign Up Now for your Church Directory Photo

### How to Walk on Ice

Michigan winters mean icy sidewalks, driveways and parking lots. Take a look at this handy guide that gives pointers on walking safely on ice.

**WINTER LESSONS:  
HOW TO WALK ON ICE**

**1** Normally, when we walk, our legs' ability to support our weight is split mid-stride.

**2** Walking this way on ice forces each leg to support the weight of the body at an angle that is not perpendicular to the surface of the ice, resulting in a nasty fall.

*oblique angle = nasty fall*

**WRONG WAY**

**1** To walk on ice, keep your center of gravity over your front leg.

**2** One animal that has figured this out is a penguin. Think of yourself as a penguin and you'll be all right.

**RIGHT WAY**

**FACT:** On April 8, 2003, Dr. Robert Atkins, inventor of the famed Atkins Diet, slipped on icy pavement and suffered severe head trauma. He died nine days later.

**FACT:** Approximately 60 people die each year in the United States as a result of slipping on the ice. This is about as many as will die from a tornado.



## Campus Ministry -- Spring Break Trips Are Coming!

*Our college students will travel soon on mission and discipleship trips. Please pray for them from February 27 to March 6.*

**Dominican Republic** - In partnership with Young Life College, this trip continues a vital partnership with Vida Joven at the Pico Escondido camp near Jarabacoa, Dominican Republic. Students participate in construction projects for the camp, which hundreds of Dominican children, youth, and young adults attend each summer.

**Kentuckiana** - This is a new mission and service trip to Kentuckiana, the metro Louisville area along the border of Indiana and Kentucky. Students will stay at St. John United Presbyterian Church in New Albany, Indiana, a church that is surrounded by a neighborhood where many children and their families live in poverty. The church has a strong ministry with the children in the neighborhood, and they built a family life center in 2002 to host after school programs for these children. Our students will work with these children and also spend time in Louisville.

**Colorado** - A discipleship retreat will be held in Colorado where students will ski, build relationships with one another, and have conversations of faith together.

To our wonderful supporters,



Hello from Sunny Niger! We are so happy to be part of what God has called you to do in the world and very grateful for the gifts and support you've shared with us! We're thinking of you as your leaves are changing, your weather is getting frigid, and the snow threatens to come. Here it still feels like the middle of July.

Our kids are studying about leaves this week. We as a family are learning lots of new things and words just to do normal things and to interact with our neighbors. Many of the people in our neighborhood don't have running water, but we found a big water tank for our house so that we can store water at the times when the city turns the water flow on. Right now we're trying to figure out the best

system for opening it at the right times to collect water and also when we can share that water with others and still not run out before the end of the day!

We appreciate your care and prayers and we pray for God's peace for you in your day to day living!


