Dear Friends,

One of my (Megan) favorite parts of our New Testament stories is when we get to read about the disciples working



with and learning from Jesus. When I was younger, I used to think "wow, these disciples aren't very smart, they ask a lot of questions and don't remember much." But now that I'm older and have been through confirmation class as a confirmand and as a leader, I realize how very real the disciples are being portrayed in these stories. We frequently ask a

lot of questions, wonder why we are doing things, have moments of self-doubt, and need to be reminded of our abilities to be leaders and followers of Christ.

As I reflect on the journey our eighth-grade youth and their parents have taken this year, I like to think of ourselves as the disciples asking the questions over and over again of Jesus. And especially Jesus' response to them. Though sassy sometimes, Jesus always gave them a response rooted in love and often a response that required more questions than answers, which is perfect for our confirmation journey. This journey was not about teaching our confirmands to spit back the correct answers, rather it

was prodding them to continue asking questions, an invitation to think deeply about what is important to them, to the church, and to our world.

On this journey, we met in "typical" classroom spaces at church, we met on Zoom, we were even fortunate to meet outside around campfires and labyrinths. We laughed and played games and we also asked difficult questions like: What does it mean to be a disciple? How can we know and trust God? How do we show Christ's

love in the world? What does it mean to join First Presbyterian Church? Most importantly, we shared stories about ourselves and asked more questions around these questions, these stories, and everything else that came up during this journey.

Grounded in the stories of the disciples who went before us,

we follow their lead to always ask questions while also stepping up into leadership roles, seeking to follow Jesus' call to show love in this world. Mark and I are excited that another group of wonderful and amazing confirmation students met with Session on April 20 to be affirmed in their journey to become full members of First Presbyterian Church. On April 24, we had the distinct pleasure to welcome them into full membership of First Presbyterian Church during our 9:30 a.m. worship service. We hope that you will welcome our newest members with open hearts, open minds, and open arms as they continue their faith journey alongside the rest of us.


NEXT FAST TRACK TO MEMBERSHIP - SUNDAY, MAY 8



Stephen Ministry Grief Books Help!

A friend on the west coast posted that a very close and longtime friend had just died suddenly. As I read through all the replies, I wondered how I could help because just adding another reply seemed inadequate. Then I thought of of-

fering to send her the "Journeying Through Grief" books. Initially I hesitated because she wasn't religious, so I decided to message her, telling her about the books, saying she might find them helpful, and asking if she'd like me to send them to her. She responded positively saying that she would welcome the books. I wrote a short letter to go with the first book, and sent it off. A week later, she messaged me with her thanks and a brief comment on how the book gave her comfort. Over the next year, each time I sent her a book, she responded with some additional words of thanks. Once she even made a public post with a picture of the books and tagged me, saying, "I feel so much less alone." I am blessed that God gave me the chance to reach out to her and do something that made a lasting difference during her grief. These books are





BLOOD ORANGE NIGHT - My Journey to the Edge of Madness

This is a memoir detailing a woman's accidental descent into prescription benzodiazepine dependence and the life-threatening impacts of the drug's long-term use. As she raises her infant daughter and a special-needs one-year-old son, she suffers from insomnia, sleeping an hour or less each night. She loses her job as a journalist and her relationship with her husband grows distant. Her doctor prescribes benzodiazepines—a family of drugs that includes Xanax, Valium, Klonopin, Ativan—and increases her dosage on a regular basis. Following her doctor's orders, Melissa takes the pills night after night; her body begins to shut down and she collapses while holding her infant daughter. Only then does Melissa learn that her doctor—like numerous doctors—has over-prescribed the medication and stopping cold turkey could lead to psychosis or fatal seizures. Benzodiazepine addiction is not well-studied, and few experts know how to help Melissa as she begins the months-long process of tapering off the pills without suffering debilitating, potentially deadly consequences. Each page thrums with



the heartbeat of Melissa's struggle—how many hours has she slept? How many milligrams has she taken? Over time, she fights for her health and her ability to care for her children. *Blood Orange Night* shines a light on the prescription benzodiazepine epidemic as it reaches a crisis point in this country.

Make Your Wishes Known

One of the most important things you can do for yourself and your family is to make sure your loved ones know what your wishes are concerning your health and well-being. While this can be a difficult topic to talk about, it is necessary if you want others to be able to carry out any plans that you hope for in the event you cannot carry them out yourself. As Mr. Rogers once said, "Anything that's human



is mentionable, and anything that is mentionable can be more manageable. When we can talk about our feelings, they become less overwhelming, less upsetting and less scary."

Since 2008, National Healthcare Decision Day has been set for April 16, the day right after tax day. But truly, any day can be healthcare decision day, because it is so important for folks to take the time to write down their healthcare wishes in a legal and binding way. One legal document recommended is called *Five Wishes* and it is an advance directive created by the non-profit organization, Aging with Dignity. You can go to the *Five Wishes* website and, for a nominal fee of \$5.00, you can print and fill out the online form. The link is here:

Or you can email the parish nurses at First Pres, as we have some Five Wishes documents available: parishnurse@first-presbyterian.org.

Here are the questions on the Five Wishes document that you will answer:

Wish 1: The Person I Want to Make Care Decisions for Me When I Can't.

Wish 2: The Kind of Medical Treatment I Want or Don't Want.

Wish 3: How Comfortable I Want to Be.

Wish 4: How I Want People to Treat Me.

Wish 5: What I Want My Loved Ones to Know.

At the end of the form, there is a place for a signature and having it witnessed. The American Bar Association's Commission on Law and Aging confirms that *Five Wishes* currently meets the legal requirements for advance directives in 46 states, including Michigan. *Five Wishes* is a wonderful way to ensure that you receive the care you want if you are ever unable to advocate it for yourself. Prayerfully consider making these decisions sooner rather than later. Any day would be the perfect date to make your wishes known.

Friends In Deed

Imagine being a young woman trying to break out of poverty, holding down three part-time jobs, earning between \$11–17 per hour and your only transportation is a used car worth about \$2,000 that keeps breaking down every three months. There are many women in the Circles Program at Friends In Deed who depend on this kind of broken-down transportation to keep their jobs so that they can pay their rent and buy food.

Now think about a used car that you, or someone you know, might own but don't drive anymore, a car in good working order but for which you, or they, might receive a tax deduction if donated to Friends In Deed for their car program. (Friends In Deed receives donated cars, has them checked over, and then gives them to people in dire need of reliable transportation as they work their way out of poverty.) What would a car like that mean to a young mother trying to maintain her employment, with children to get to school, groceries to buy, and a work schedule to keep?

Sewing Angels

In 1999, when members of First Presbyterian Church went to Dumaguete City in the Philippines to build homes with Habitat for Humanity, one of the first things the women there told us was that they wanted to learn how to sew. We were there to help them build houses, but we kept this request in our minds and close to our hearts.

On subsequent trips we took with us donated sewing machines, fabric, notions (thread, scissors, needles) and church members who could teach sewing and needle work. Under tarps for shade and in the heat of the Philippines, for hours, men and women of the villages came to learn to sew. Cynthia Calhoun, Jane Kinzinger, Harriet Brouwer, Elsie Weil, Alma Chand, and Laurie Kotchenruther helped the mothers and fathers make children's clothing, curtains, adult dresses, and pillow cases. With pride in their accomplishments, they took pictures of their products and held fashion shows with music and lots of laughter. It was a wonderful way to work and learn together, to share languages, to get to know each other and to share God's love.

The village leaders eventually engaged a local sewing teacher. To this day, in the community centers that we built while we were there, men and women get together to sew. However, fabric, at a cost they can afford, is not readily available in poor Habitat for Humanity villages. Here in Ann Arbor, there are many of us who purchase, or are given, fabric in the hope of creating a garment or two, but, eventually for lack of time, store the material in a closet instead.

NOW we have a way to put that fabric to use. DONATE your fabric. First Pres is collecting the fabric to pack and send to the Philippines during April and May. Light-weight fabrics like cotton, linen and rayon, in lengths of not less than one yard, are preferred. Collection boxes will be marked and available in the Welcome Center from April 1 to May 15. Session Digest — March 2022 Highlights

At the Stated Meeting of Session on March 16, 2022, via Zoom . . .

The Session:

- Welcomed New Members Ashley and Brian Marentette, joining by Reaffirmation of Faith, Ankie Schuitema, joining by Letter of Transfer from First Presbyterian Church Alameda (Alameda, CA), Ellen Chapel joining by Reaffirmation of Faith, and David Chapel, joining by Letter of Transfer from North Parma United Methodist Church (Parma, MI).
- Approved the request from the Congregational Nominating Committee for Session to call a meeting of the congregation on April 3, 2022, to elect two Elders, Nancy Fox and Penny Papadopoulas, to fill unexpired terms.
- Endorsed (with enthusiasm) the motion from the Personnel Committee to ask the Committee on Ministry of the Presbytery of Detroit to approve First Presbyterian Church Ann Arbor to call Rev. Mark Mares to serve as Associate Pastor for Youth and Family Ministries. A meeting of the congregation will be called for later this summer to approve the Terms of Call. Chris Dahl (Personnel Committee) advised that the new Pastor has met with Rev. Mares on three occasions and strongly supports this move.
- Supported the request from the Worship Committee to approve the baptism of Addison Kaercher, daughter of Kelsey and Tommy Kaercher on March 20, 2022.

Other Reports / Discussions

- Mary McKeever (Deacons) reported the Deacons delivered five (5) comfort kits since the February Session meeting. Work of the Deacons prayer teams, cookie baking, Sunday greeting, and serving communion are ways the Deacons continue to serve the members of First Pres. She encouraged Elders to sign up to serve communion; training is available. Deacons are also calling members on their birthday. Elders can contact Rev. Rogers if they would like to also support this activity.
- Elder Steve McKenny provided a summary of the Stated Meeting of the Presbytery of Detroit held on February 26. Conducted as a "hybrid" meeting (participation via Zoom and in-person) the meeting opened with routine business. A worship service was held in which the Presbytery's new Moderator and Vice Moderator were installed. Of special note: 1) The Nominations Committee is looking for more volunteers to participate on committees to fill approximately 20 open positions and to provide balanced representation, 2) An amendment to a motion to increase the number of meetings (5-6/year) failed, 3) Motions were presented related to the dissolution of four congregations, and 4) One Inquirer was examined and enrolled as a Candidate Under Care of the Presbytery. The next meeting (hybrid format) is on Tuesday, May 24, at Grosse Ille Presbyterian Church.
- Rev. Sanderford requested Session Committee Chairs provide a roster of their committees and related Work Groups'
 membership to be approved at the April Session meeting as required by the Book of Order. Once the rosters are approved, they can be uploaded to the website.
- Elder Sue Gott, Chair, Strategic Planning Guiding Team, thanked those who attended the 2022 Planning Meeting in February. One of the outcomes was an agreement that the Strategic Plan could be strengthened by greater engagement with the congregation to establish near-term priorities. How to effectively achieve such engagement would be included on the Agenda for the College of Leaders meeting in May (formerly the College of Elders), in which Deacons will also participate. Elder Gott said she would welcome ideas and suggestions for "recruiting" congregational participation to ensure the Strategic Plan is a "living" document. She also asked that Committee Chairs forward the name of the representative to the SPGT.
- The DIAA Work Group (Diversity/Inclusion/Accessibility/Accountability) presented a draft Statement of Core Values of our congregation a statement of unequivocal welcome to and inclusion of all. Elder Marti Wendler, Chair, DIAA, asked Session to reflect on the Statement and forward to her any comments and/or suggested revisions. The Work Group will present a final version for Session approval at the April meeting.
- Elder Jim Cameron, Chair, Personnel Committee, reported that Nancy Fox has joined the Personnel Committee.

Session Highlights (continued)

- Elder Dick Carlisle, Personnel Committee, presented a new organizational structure for church administration, one that recognizes the skills and experience of current personnel and supports a collaborative management protocol shared among Finance (Anna Miller), Facilities (Adrian Prundeanu), and Church Operations (Linda Robinson). This will go into effect immediately in preparation for the new Lead Pastor.
- Elder Bruce Thomson, Chair, Finance Committee, reported continued "good news" for February with expenses less than budgeted and revenues higher. Unfortunately, the Endowment has suffered some losses to due to current stock market volatility.
- Elder Deanne Woodruff, Co-Chair Capital Campaign Steering Committee, shared a model of the Steering Committee structure and how it would interface with other sub-teams. Dan Mitas, an experience program manager, has been named Co-Chair. Other members of the Steering Committee are Sue Gott, Keith Molin, Pat Tamblyn, and Rol Kibler. Elder Woodruff said the Committee is still seeking a Youth and Family representative. She welcomes people to contact her with any questions.
- Elder Steve Gerhardt presented a series of "process maps" to illustrate the purpose, scope, and operating plan for the Capital Campaign, defining the various steps and milestones of the project. Roles and responsibilities were also highlighted. He encouraged comments to be sent to him via Email.
- Elder Gail Grady, Mission Committee, gave a report on the church's response to the crisis in Ukraine, which includes both financial assistance and supplies of tangible goods. Financial donations will be channeled through the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, a trusted partner that has the highest rating for trustworthiness. Tangible goods donated by the congregation along with those collected from a drive on the University of Michigan Campus will be packaged and transported to the Ukrainian-American Crisis Response Committee of Michigan facilities in Warren before shipment to Europe. Alexandra Gusikhin, a student and member of our choir with a Ukrainian heritage, requested the support of First Pres to store the collections from University of Michigan.

PASTORS' REPORTS

- A Special Meeting of Session is Called for Monday, April 18, 2022, to hear a report from the Pastor Nominating Committee. The format is TBD; information to be forwarded as the meeting date approaches.
- Rev. Evans McGowan reflected on his tenure at First Presbyterian Church as his termination of service is effective at the end of May. He said he felt he has made positive contributions in response to the changes and challenges of the past two years and the church is in a good place. He is working with committees and staff to prepare for this transition. He thanked Session and his colleagues for the support extended to him during his time at First Pres. Many Elders expressed their gratitude for Rev. McGowan's ministry and leadership, wishing him well on this next stage of his life.

The Session is the governing board of the church. It consists of 24 Elders elected by the congregation to 3-year terms; they meet monthly (except, usually, in July) to oversee the church's financial and programmatic life, and to hear reports from the church's staff, committees and working groups. The Rev. Jay Sanderford currently serves as Moderator. Elder Linda Rex is Clerk of Session.
