Kristin Clark is thrilled to be returning to First Pres as our "Interim Interim" Music director. You may remember her when she was a member of the chancel choir, a section leader and soloist, and frequent guest conductor from 2000-2009.



Kristin comes back to us with an impressive resume. As a mezzo-soprano soloist, she has been lauded for her "technical prowess" and "approachability" (classical.net). She can be heard in the role of Electre on the 2015 GRAMMY nominated recording of Milhaud's L'Orestie d'Eschyle, for which Opera News described her voice as "slicing the air unassailably." In 2015, Kristin made

her solo debut in Carnegie Hall, singing Mahler's Das Lied von der Erde with the Blue Period Ensemble. Particularly at home on the concert stage, Kristin has appeared as a guest soloist with organizations such as the Tallahassee Symphony Orchestra, the Illinois Symphony Orchestra, the Toledo Symphony, the Bozeman Symphony, the Oakland Choral Society, the University Musical Society, and the Adrian Symphony. Other notable concert appearances include the world premiere of Susan Botti's Tagore Madrigals at the American Academy in Rome and a Canadian Tour of Aaron Copland's *In the Beginning*.

Kristin completed her doctorate in vocal performance at the University of Michigan, where she also received Master's degrees in vocal performance and choral conducting. She is currently an Assistant Professor and the Coordinator of Voice at Adrian College. In the summer, she teaches on the voice faculty at Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp and the MPulse Vocal Arts Institute and Musical Theatre Workshops. Former students of hers have gone on to perform leading and supporting roles on Broadway, Off-Broadway, and in national tours, and to pursue graduate studies in opera. Kristin lives in Ypsilanti with her husband (and favorite pianist), Phillip, and their blended family of five children.



Celebrating a New Home for Dinosaurs – UM's New Museum of Natural History





Stephen Ministry: A Look At Books!



The Stephen Ministry Library is open for all people. It is full of books to help you deal with transition, trauma, stress, and grief. It has books with great ideas for how to help others in need! Come in anytime the Sanctuary is open and get a book! Each month, our Stephen Ministry Library Leaders - Chris Queen and Cyndy Colton, will highlight one of our books to share with you.

The book titled *The Case for Christ-A Journalist's Personal Investigation of the Evidence for Jesus* is written by Lee Strobel, an experienced investigative reporter and graduate of Yale Law School. Strobel is an atheist-turned-Christian who collects the vast evidence of the claims of Christ. This book covers the historical basis for Christianity and addresses challenges to its veracity.

The author's spiritual journey starts when his wife tells him that she has become a Christian. He fears he will lose the fun-loving companion and friend he has known for years. Over time Strobel witnesses positive changes in his wife's character, integrity, and her personal self-confidence. Eventually he wants to better understand the basis for the changes in his wife's beliefs and faith. Over two years Strobel reads books, interviews scholars, asks questions, analyzes history, explores archaeology,

studies ancient literature, and for the first time in his life studies the Bible verse by verse.

With his investigative reporter background, Strobel searches for truth based on historical evidence. In fact, "evidence" is an overall theme that runs the course of the book and supports the other general themes: a "case for Christ" and "reliability of the Bible." Strobel handles the information as if addressing a jury and asks direct questions of his expert witnesses such as: how reliable is the New Testament? Evidence admitted addresses both sides of every issue and is presented in a way that allows readers to draw their own conclusions as if they are the jury determining the verdict. Anyone who is interested in the historical basis for Christianity should read this book.

A Take on the Current Situation in Nicaragua

Paul and I recently traveled to Nicaragua on a Rotary Service trip. We were cautioned to 'keep a low profile' but that became laughable since it is impossible for North Americans not to stand out! We were also advised not to talk politics with the locals but we quickly discovered that many Nicaraguans were eager to talk. We also learned that displaying the Nicaraguan flag is considered an act of terrorism. Imagine living a country where flying your own flag is illegal. Despite warnings we felt very safe and were warmly welcomed by the people we met in the communities.

We were delighted to spend time with Emily Hewes, Development Director, CEPAD USA. CEPAD (Council of Protestant Churches in Nicaragua) continues to support many rural communities: teaching sustainable farming practices, empowering women, training community leaders and much more. CEPAD has resumed hosting mission teams. Emily shared that while the staff of CEPAD's political views range from pro-government to pro-opposition and every sentiment in between, they manage to work together with the common goal of helping those with the greatest need.

The crisis that began in April of 2018 led to a devastating decline in volunteerism and tourism in Nicaragua just as the country was beginning to reap so many benefits from the increase of tourism over the past decade. It is during times like these when many Nicaraguans and their friends must return to basics, reallocate, rebuild, and regenerate. In this spirit, it is our plan to maintain First Presbyterian's partnership with CEPAD and plan another multi-generational trip in 2020. 

NEW SERIES Exploring the Faith

"Getting to Know You - Who is the YOU in this multi-religious society?"

Christians all over the country are getting to know people from other religious and spiritual perspectives different from our own. Dialogue, engagement and collaboration are resulting in stronger communities who trust, understand and respect each other. Presbyterian Christians who are taking this journey do so because Jesus said to "love your neighbor", and one way to show love is to ask questions, be hospitable and let go of whatever prejudices we might have.



Because the religious landscape of our county is much like that of the whole country, the Interfaith Round Table of Washtenaw County has arranged for us to spend an hour of class time with representatives of four different religions and with a person who is "spiritual but not religious." More than just a lecture on a world religion, these sessions will be more personal and more engaging, leaving significant time for questions and answers.

This series assumes that all religious and spiritual perspectives differ in beliefs and practices, and that several major principles are very similar from outlook to outlook, one of those being the principle of compassion. Each presenter will discuss not only the basics of their faith perspective, but also what compassion means to them and what it looks like on a daily basis.
