PEACE

WORSHIP

Over the last several months we have written about the Order of Worship as outlined in the Book of Common Worship of the PC(USA). In the September edition of First Press we talked about the Gospel and Epistle



readings and the Revised Common Lectionary. All of these things lead up to the Proclamation of the Word, most often in the form of a sermon. At FPC, this sermon might be offered by one of our clergy staff, by a guest preacher, or even in some form other than the spoken word – a musical offering or even a liturgical drama, dance or visual art.

To quote the Book of Common Worship: "The sermon, based on the scripture read in worship, proclaims the good news of the risen Lord, and presents the gift and calling of the gospel." Through the sermon we encounter Jesus the Christ in God's word, are equipped to follow him more faithfully, and are inspired to proclaim the gospel to others through our own words and deeds. If this sounds like a tall order, it surely is. Pastors spend hours - really days in prayer and thoughtful study for every sermon they preach, and ultimately trust in the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Their sermons must faithfully interpret the scripture, but also communicate with and be relevant to their particular congregation, which is often diverse in background, stage of life, and place in their faith journey. The sermon most often begins with a prayer that the words that are offered and the response of the listeners are acceptable to God.

Every aspect of the worship service is based on the scripture that the pastor has chosen, but the sermon, more than any other element, brings the word of God to the people.

Next month we will look at the many things that might follow the sermon, depending on the particular week, the schedule of the sacraments, and the custom of the congregation.

Origami Peace Crane Art Installation

Soaring overhead in our sanctuary is a brilliantly-hued representation of the prayers of the people. Each flash of color is an origami crane. And inside each bird is written the



name of a church member who was prayed for as the bird was folded. Yet the focus of this artwork is larger than any individual or congregation. These peace cranes were folded during the Covid-19 pandemic by FPC members. The work – made up of over 3,500 cranes – also marked the International Day of Peace, Sept. 21. On this date, people around the globe were encouraged to participate in acts of peace. And in addition, these peace cranes support our Annual Giving Campaign, Peace by Piece.

Why origami cranes? Early in 1955, a 12-year-old girl named Sadako Sasaki (佐々木 禎子) developed leukemia as a result of exposure to radiation from the nuclear bomb dropped on her hometown, Hiroshima, at the end of World War II. Visiting her in the hospital, Sadako's best friend reminded her of the Japanese legend that, if she could fold 1,000 cranes, her wish to be made well might be granted.

Stories differ as to whether Sadako was able to finish 1,000 cranes before her death in October 1955, or whether her friends completed the task in her memory. Regardless, a statue of Sadako holding a golden crane now stands in the Hiroshima Peace Memorial and, every day, cranes arrive from people all over the world who hope and pray and work for peace.

Like Sadako's cranes, the exact number of First Pres' cranes is unknown. We estimate it to be more than 3,500. Many thanks to all who prayed these three-dimensional prayers and helped create our art installation that can now inspire us all to serve the Prince of Peace.


40 Gospels by Joel Schoon-Tanis - Opening on Oct. 8 at 6:30 p.m.

About the project...

Approaching the world through a childlike lens, Joel Schoon-Tanis juxtaposes realistic images and whimsical kid drawings in retelling the Gospels. The result lets him shed fresh light on these centuries old stories, inviting the viewer to think in new ways as well.

Over his 30-year professional art career, Schoon-Tanis has often explored Biblical themes. His love of animals and children initially had him painting a lot of Noah's Ark! Soon he started exploring other stories, which led to the illustration of the NIrV Kids' Study Bible. In 2015 he took on the entire Biblical narrative in his first large format art book, "40: The Biblical Story."

In the years since the first "40", Schoon-Tanis has taken multiple trips to the Holy Land, and these trips piqued his interest in diving deeper into the Gospel narratives. Specifically, he became interested in the different viewpoints and themes taken by the different Gospel writers. And so a new set of 40 images was born.



Through fun, color, and whimsy, this collection will take viewers, both young and old, through Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John in new ways. The paintings will inspire both joy and inspiration.

About Joel...



Joel Schoon-Tanis has been a working artist for 30 years. That means he has made a lot of art, as well as shown it all over the world.

Joel has written and illustrated over a dozen books (recently "At Psalm's School" and "At God's Table"), painted murals all over the U.S.A. as well as in Kenya, Zambia, and the Separation Wall in Palestine, and painted nearly a gazillion pieces of "fine art." His work is in churches, children's hospitals, schools, restaurants, businesses and many private collections. In 2016 one of his images was presented to the Pope. In 2017 he joined international artists in Leipzig, Germany to create art during a celebration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. Sometimes people lure him out to talk about the creative life (among other things).

He lives in Holland, Michigan with his super smart wife Kathy, PhD., and creative, clever girls Harper and Beatrix.

Lunch and Learn welcomes Ken Fischer!

On Thursday, Oct. 14, Mature Ministries' Lunch & Learn will present Ken Fischer, President Emeritus of the University Musical Society (UMS) and currently a Guest Faculty member at the University of Michigan's School of Music, Theatre and Dance (SMTD). In the summer of 2020, Ken published a book entitled Everybody In, Nobody Out: Inspiring Community at Michigan's University Musical Society, chronicling his tenure as Director of UMS (1987–2017) and his goal of expanding



and diversifying that organization's programming and audiences, reflected in the book's title. The book includes a Foreword by musical icon Wynton Marsalis, a longtime collaborator with the UMS and close personal friend of Ken.

Though peppered with colorful anecdotes of how successful this mission came to be, the book is neither a history of UMS nor a memoir of Ken's significant accomplishments. Rather it is a reflection on the power of the performing arts to engage and enrich communities – not by handing down cultural enrichment from on high, but by meeting communities where they live and helping them preserve heritage, incubate talent and find ways to make community voices heard. The goal of this book closely matches the Mission and Vision of First Pres in its goal of greater inclusion on all levels.

The Oct. 14 Lunch & Learn will begin at noon with a box lunch eaten outside (either on the Terrace or under the Canopy on the Hill Street Lawn). At 1 p.m., all are then invited to the Sanctuary, where Ken will be interviewed by First Pres member and longtime member of the UMS Choral Union, Marilyn Meeker. This will be followed by a Q&A session and a book-signing. All are invited to the talk and book-signing, even if they haven't attended the lunch. Copies of the book will be available for purchase during the lunch hour for signing. Books cost \$20 (tax included in that price), cash or check, and ALL proceeds of sales go directly to UMS. This is Ken's way of continuing to support the organization he served for 30 years. Please join us for the first local in-person book-signing Ken has been able to have since the outbreak of the COVID pandemic! Watch for an on-line signup to be emailed to you, or find it on the website when posted. All box lunches will be ordered and must be paid for ahead of time.

Mature Ministries Travels to Saginaw

Join First Pres Mature Ministries on Oct. 28 for a visit to the Marshall Fredericks Sculpture Museum in Saginaw. Fredericks was a Detroit-based commercial sculptor, best known locally for the "Spirit of Detroit" outside Detroit City Hall, the large Eagle inside the Michigan Stadium, and the largest cross in the U.S. in Indian River, Mich. The museum visit includes time in the artist's studio, his archives, and a number of plaster casts and finished works, all of which were placed in the museum by Fredericks himself.



Lunch will follow the museum visit at Zehnder's in Frankenmuth. Its family-style chicken dinners include appetizers, soup, salads, fall vegetables, potatoes, noodles, stuffing and plenty of famous Frankenmuth chicken. A morning of art and lunch at a Michigan favorite – sounds like a fall adventure to remember! **Depart at 8 a.m. from the church and return by 4:30 p.m**. The price of \$50 includes lunch and bus travel. **Museum admission is free; on site donations are welcome.**

PASTORAL CARE



On Monday, Oct. 4, at 7 p.m., we are honored to have Dr. John Greden with us to present a Stephen Ministry-sponsored Continuing Education lecture entitled "Overcoming Clinical Depressions: The Future is Now, Your Help is Needed" in Monteith Hall. This event is open to all of our members and

the community. All are invited to attend. This presentation will be live-streamed on the First Pres YouTube page and available to watch later. Dr. Greden is the Rachel Upjohn Professor Psychiatry and Clinical Neurosciences Active Emeritus; Research Professor, Molecular and Behavioral Neurosciences, Founder and Executive Director, University of Michigan Comprehensive Depression Center, Founding Chair, National Network of Depression Centers, Chair Emeritus, University of Michigan Department of Psychiatry. He has authored or coauthored more than 400 publications, has presented at over 335 invited and named lectures, has three decades of NIH funding as investigator, co-investigator and consultant and currently leads a multi-site study of pharmacogenomics and developing treatment strategies to prevent recurrences of depression and bipolar disorders. Among his many accolades and leadership positions, in 2020, he was the recipient of the University of Michigan annual Board of Regents Award for Distinguished Public Service.



BOOK REPORT – "Creative Care – A Revolutionary Approach to DEMENTIA and ELDER CARE" by ANNE BASTING, PhD



Anne Basting PhD is the author of the book titled "Creative Care – A Revolutionary Approach to DEMENTIA and ELDER CARE." She is a MacArthur Genius Grant winner and a theater professor at UW-Milwaukee. Basting offers a distinctive combination of personal narrative (her mother's recent diagnosis of Alzheimer's), research, and recommendations on how everyone can develop "creative care" to friends and family who have dementia. Although her focus is on people with dementia, she offers much hope in her endorsement of creativity to reach and connect with people who others might write off as "gone."

Early in her career, Basting noticed a problem: today's elderly – especially those experiencing dementia and Alzheimer's – are often isolated in nursing homes or segregated in elder-care settings, making the final years of life feel lonesome and devoid of meaning. To lessen their

sense of aloneness, Basting developed an approach that combines methods from the world of theater and improvisation with evidence-based therapies that connect people using their own creativity and imagination. This approach fosters storytelling and active listening, allowing elders to freely share ideas and stories without worrying about getting the details "correct."

In Creative Care, Basting lays the foundation for an extensive transformation in our approach to elder care and uses compelling, touching stories to inspire and guide us all—family, friends, and health professionals—in new ways and satisfying ways. Creative Care promises to bring light and hope to a community that needs it most. This is a wonderful book, even if you only read it for Anne Basting's story.

FPC Tree Update

The Staff takes the First Presbyterian Church grounds seriously and wanted to update the Congregation on recent occurrences.

On Sept. 1, a substantial 10-inch-wide branch came down from a Honey Locust tree near Monteith Hall. Because there was no sign of disease and no high-wind situation, the branch is believed to have fallen from under its own weight. Due to its location near foot traffic and a liability risk, an arborist recommended that the tree be removed and it was on Sept. 2. This tree had earlier lost an eight-inch limb on July 22, 2019.

Earlier this summer, on Aug. 12, a Hickory tree close to the FPC Terrace fell. The oldest tree on the property, it was estimated to be 225 years old.

Facilities Manager Adrian Prundeanu responded to both situations quickly and was able to get lumberjacks in to remove fallen branches and trees within 24 hours – minimizing any disruption to the life of the Church. He later updated the Property Committee on the situation at its September meeting.

A "First Pres Tree Inventory" was created in 2018 after the Church had a "Tree Report Evaluation" made by arborist David L. Roberts, PhD from MSU. That list is updated when we remove or trim a significant part of a tree. Unfortunately, FPC has lost seven aging trees in the past three years. However, 70 mature trees remain on our 3.6-acre FPC property.

Nurturing trees from seedlings to full growth takes many years, but the Church is currently nursing a baby Oak. The Property Committee has discussed – and is considering – a larger tree nursery.

She is very motivated to find a better job so that she can support her family and maintain housing long-term.
